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
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

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

Three Sizes of Wire. Although he always referred to himself as a civil engineer, John A. Roebling's greatest and most lasting innovation was an achievement of mechanical engineering. He devised a helical wire strand made with three sizes of wire to improve the service life of his wire ropes. This concept, for which he never sought a patent, is still made and used daily all over the world. It is now known as Warrington Construction.
